



HENRY PURCELL (c. 1659-1695) Purcell was one of England's greatest composers. Even though he lived but 36 years, he created many fine works. He was most successful in setting of the English language to music in his songs. Few composers have achieved his great output, variety, and success in so short a life span.



JOHANN SEBASTIAN BACH (1685-1750) J. S. Bach was not only one of the world's greatest composers, but he was also a great teacher, a remarkable performer and a wonderful person. He was always interested in his family—he married twice and had a total of twenty children—taught not only his children but also his wives to sing and play and wrote many exercises and pieces for them as well as for his other students. These works were not only fine teaching pieces but were also masterpieces because of Bach's genius. He was a very religious and modest man. Late in his life one of his admirers asked him how he was able to write so much great music and accomplish so much in so many ways. His answer is a lesson for all of us: "If you would work as long and as hard as I, you, too, could achieve this."

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



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

LEOPOLD MOZART (1719-1787) Not only must Leopold Mozart be credited for being the father of and teacher of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, but he was an excellent musician, author and teacher. To him we owe the honor for being one of the first to write a book on violin playing. It is a fine book and tells us much about the way the violin was played (and taught) in those days. Leopold also wrote a considerable amount of music for violin, orchestra and piano. He was a good father and the letters between him and his children indicate love and respect for each other, even though they didn't always agree on things.
