New Play Spaces Support Student Growth, Enjoyment

The summer months give students across the District time to focus a little more on playing, whether it be through games with their friends, visiting the pool in Shaw Park or stopping by their school to enjoy some time on the playground. This summer, playing is also a focus for staff members and parent volunteers in the District as the long-awaited playground renovations at Meramec Elementary School and the Family Center come to fruition.

Meramec Elementary students will return to school this fall to discover a new play structure on the school's current blacktop, complete with slides, tunnels, climbing structures and swings. The equipment, which is

all age-appropriate, also includes shaded spaces for students to congregate and play and a climbing net perfect for active, young learners. Phase two of the renovation is set to be completed by the end of the 2018-2019 school year and will include a nature area in place of the school's current playground.

"From the new naturescape area with secret pathways and sensory gardens to a new play structure with a rope climber and swings, we are confident that our Meramec students are going to have a blast on this new playground," said outgoing Meramec PTO President Jenny Abeles.

The Family Center's new play space under construction this summer also dovetails with the school's focus on nature education. Phase one of the upper playground renovation adjacent to the school's urban forest includes the installation of swings, a geodesic climbing dome, hand-over-hand bars and a sunshade. The school is continuing to fundraise for the second phase of the upper playground renovation, which will include a mud kitchen, sandbox and tunnels.

"Open-ended play equipment enhances imaginative play, inspires creativity and cooperation, and allows children to experience appropriate risktaking," said Family Center Director Debbie Reilly. "Children will love playing on this new equipment!"

The playground renovations at both schools will include the installation of ground surfaces that will keep students safe as they play. The Meramec playground will include Eco Turf, a synthetic grass with a sand infill and a safety shock cushioning pad. At the Family Center, an engineered wood fiber will be installed.

The new Meramec and Family Center playgrounds have been several years in the making, relying heavily on the involvement of staff and parent volunteers throughout the planning and fundraising process. The time invested by these individuals, along with financial investments through donations from their school communities and through grants, has ensured these play spaces are not only developmentally appropriate, but they also provide a fun way for students to continue the learning process - even during recess. •

What do we want for all graduates? What are the cognitive, personal and interpersonal competencies we want for EVERY student who graduates from our District? In this edition of Inside Clayton, you will find the listing of colleges and universities our 2018 graduates will attend next school year. Behind each school listed is both a unique story and an individual learner. I believe beyond supporting ALL students in determining their post-graduation plans, we need to develop their capabilities for navigating an ever-changing world. We want our students to be adaptable, innovative and collaborative to handle both the novel experiences and the challenges they will face.

Over the past five years, we have supported the individual needs of our students using the following strategic themes as our quide.

Our Technology Integration Plan is coming to fruition with new devices and technology being more accessible and mobile for students at all levels. We aligned our resources with our focus on the whole child and hired social workers to support the social/ emotional health of our students. We also initiated a Parent Speaker Series to support the development of parents. The Clayton Education Foundation provided \$40,000 worth of grants to support the innovative ideas of our teachers.

As we move forward with our next strategic plan, we need to start with strategic thinking to decide what we want for our students. We are going to first develop a Profile of a Graduate that will prioritize the competencies we want for every Clayton graduate. This profile will allow us to work backwards (starting with students first) as we collaborate to develop our next strategic plan. In August, I will start seeking community support in this process. I would appreciate if you would consider participating.

As a result, our Board and administration are looking ahead and exploring the possibility of asking the community for a tax increase in the near future. District Named a 2018 Top Workplace by Post-Dispatch

The School District of Clayton has been named a 2018 Top Workplace by The St. Louis Post-Dispatch. The list is based solely on employee feedback gathered through

a third-party survey administered by research partner Energage, LLC. The anonymous survey measures several aspects of workplace culture, including alignment, execution and connection.

2018 "Top Workplaces is more than just recognition," said Doug Claffey, CEO of Energage. "Our research shows organizations that earn ST. LOUIS POST-DISPATCH the award attract better talent, experience lower turnover, and are better equipped to deliver bottom-line results. Their leaders prioritize and carefully craft a healthy workplace culture that supports employee engagement."

This is the first year the District has participated in the program, and only 150 area employers scored high enough to make the list. More than 350 Clayton staff

Rubin, an incumbent, was also re-elected to her position as Board Secretary. Additionally, the Board voted to retain President Kristin Redington, Vice President Lily Raymond and Treasurer Joe Miller in their officer positions for a second yearlong term. •

2018-2019 Budget Update

Last month, the Board of Education approved the budget for the 2018-2019 school year. Budget highlights include the following.

- The operating revenue budget is projected to decrease by \$812,000, or 1.64 percent to a total of \$48.6 million, largely due to a reduction of the District's overall assessed valuation and subsequent payback of protested taxes, which is anticipated to be approximately 40 percent of total collections.
- The operating expenditure budget is projected to increase by \$783,000 or 1.47 percent to a total of \$54.0 million, despite how the District continues to work to control costs and align resources with priorities while also looking at other strategies to achieve financial balance with minimal impact on students and classrooms.
- Operating revenues will fall short of operating expenses causing a reduction in the operating fund balance of \$5.4 million.
- The net operating fund balance is projected to be \$10.1 million or 18.8 percent of budgeted operating expenditures, which is slightly above

the Board's fund balance goal of 18 percent of budgeted operating expenses.

The District's largest source of revenue is local property taxes, which account for approximately 75 percent of operating revenues. Missouri's constitution, specifically the Hancock Amendment, restricts the District's ability to increase its revenues from local property taxes, rendering them flat and essentially unable to keep pace with expenses. Stagnant revenue, inflationary pressures increasing expenses and slow new construction growth have caused operating expenses to exceed operating revenues for the past three years and draw down fund balances.

While deficit spending is part of the natural cycle of school finance, it cannot be sustained indefinitely, as it erodes the District's fund balance. A school district's fund balance serves two main purposes:

- to ensure adequate cash flow for operations throughout the fiscal year
- to offset expenditures in years when a district's expenditures exceed revenues

A school district builds its fund balance in the years when revenues exceed expenditures, usually following a voter-approved tax increase or a revenue increase from other sources. Districts then spend down their fund balance once operating expenses begin to exceed operating revenues. When a district's fund balance falls below its required minimum, it must either engage in shortterm borrowing, reduce its expenditures, increase its revenues or a combination of all three. Current projections, which include new revenue from projects currently under construction in Clayton's Central Business District, indicate the District will fall below its fund balance goal during the 2019-2020 school year.

The District's most recent voter-approved operating tax increase was in April 2003 (prior to that, the last operating levy increase was approved in April 1988). Please look for opportunities this fall to learn more about the District's current financial situation as we consider what steps to take to ensure that we can continue to provide the highquality education our community expects and explore the possibility of asking the community to approve an operating tax increase in April 2019. •
