District Maintains Rollback Of Residential Operating Rate

The School District of Clayton's Board of Education approved the 2021 tax rate at its Sept. 29 meeting. The residential rate will decrease from \$4.1527 to \$4.0373, while the commercial rate will increase slightly from \$4.7354 to \$4.7658. In keeping its promise made during the 2019 Prop E campaign, the residential operating rate includes a 15 cent voluntary rollback in order to only collect the additional revenue that was projected in the original request for an operating levy increase.

A "voluntary rollback" is a term used to describe the action taken by a taxing body such as a school district to not levy or charge the fully approved and taxpayer authorized tax rate.

Nutritional Notes

It can be difficult to identify natural sugar and added sugar on a nutrition label. Many companies have ditched using added sugar although high fructose corn syrup contains just as much sugar.

It is important to check the label to see if there is naturally occurring sugar or added sugar. The nutrition

label will list natural occurring sugars under total sugars and then list the amount of the total sugar that is coming from added sources. Natural occurring sugar such as lactose in milk and fructose in fruit are good sources of sugar and should be part of a well-balanced diet. The added sugar should be consumed in moderation. Ingredients to look for on a label that indicates added sugar are: invert sugar, malt syrup, rice syrup, molasses, corn syrup or sweetener.

Focus On: Parent-Teacher Conference Tips

Parent-teacher conferences are coming up. Here are a few tips from Kid's Health to prepare for the best conference possible:

Before the Conference:

- Review your child's recent grades on homework, tests, etc.
- Ask your child if there are any topics they'd like you to discuss.
- Bring questions and something to take notes in.

During the Conference:

- Exchange contact information with the teacher and figure out the best channels for communication.
- Focus on your child's learning and share any helpful details with the teacher.

After the Conference:

- Follow up and check in with the teacher on a regular basis your child's progress.
- Create a thank you note to show your appreciation for the teacher and the time they spent with you.

It is encouraged to also set up time with your children's teacher outside these conferences and check in regularly to talk about their academic progress.
