From the Superintendent

Dear Clayton Family -

Now that we've made it about halfway through the first quarter of the 2021-2022 school year, I want to check in and update you on how we are navigating another year with the COVID-19 pandemic. We started the year with a number of risk mitigation measures in place. These include requiring universal masking and maximizing physical distances in our schools, partnering with our families to keep students who have symptoms at home and encouraging a number of important health and safety practices.

Our health services staff continues to work daily to conduct contact tracing of all the cases of COVID-19 reported to us. We follow up regardless of whether a student or staff member is exposed at school or outside of school. (Incidentally, we just quarantined our first group of students due to in-school exposure. Everything else up to this point in the year has been from exposure outside of school.) Our parents have been outstanding partners in sharing information about symptoms, positive cases and exposure. This is so important in the work we are doing to keep students and staff healthy. Thank you!

Vaccines and universal masking continue to be the most effective prevention strategy in our schools. As I mentioned back in August, approximately 97 percent of our staff report that they are vaccinated. Thanks to information shared by our families, we have also been able to get a sense of how many of our eligible students are vaccinated. On average, approximately 84 percent of our students in grades seven through twelve are vaccinated and we are already planning to offer more vaccine clinics for our younger students as soon as they are eligible.

Here are a few other important COVID-related reminders to keep on your radar:

- The latest COVID-19 case data for our staff and students can be found in the dashboard on our website.
- Our COVID-19 procedures and risk mitigation measures are also posted on our website.
- Quarantines are slightly different for those identified as close contacts as compared to last year. This chart helps explain our current procedures.
 - Generally, vaccinated individuals are not required to quarantine.
 - Unvaccinated students who are close contacts will usually not have to quarantine if they are fully and correctly masked and other mitigation strategies are in place.
 - Unvaccinated staff identified as a close contact (within 6 feet for 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period; with or without a mask) will be required to quarantine for 10 days.
- Our communication protocols (revised as of 09/17/2021) for COVID-19 cases in our schools this year will be as follows:
 - Positive cases will be logged and tracked (by school) on the District's data dashboard. When an elementary or Family Center student has been at school during their infectious period, we will send an all-school email to parents and staff.
 - All students and staff who are identified as close contacts (even if they are not required to quarantine) will be notified via email and phone call of the need to quarantine and/or monitor for symptoms.

We recognize that COVID-19 is still prevalent in our community but we remain optimistic about our efforts to keep our students and staff safe, healthy and learning/working at school. I want to thank our families for being excellent partners in this work. Even though this pandemic forces us to be ready to adapt at a moment's notice, our work, supported by our families and staff, is going a long way to keep students learning at school.
