Return to Learn Update: Face Coverings and Vaccinations



Face Coverings Still Required

Face coverings are still required at all Clayton schools (indoors and outdoors) regardless of whether you have been vaccinated. Many of our students are not vaccinated or even qualify to be vaccinated, therefore are susceptible to infection.

Vaccinations and Quarantine

Staff and students who are identified as close contact of an exposure to COVID-19 will not be required to quarantine if they are fully vaccinated and symptom-free. If an individual shows evidence of the vaccine (their vaccination card), they will not be required to quarantine. If they do not show evidence of vaccination or choose not to, they will still be required to quarantine for ten days. You are



considered fully vaccinated after two weeks of receiving either your first Johnson & Johnson vaccine or two weeks after your second Moderna or Pfizer vaccine.

NewsWeek Top High Schools

Clayton High School is once again listed as one of the top non-selective public high schools in the state of Missouri in U.S. News & World Report's "Best Public High Schools" rankings. CHS, which routinely trades places for the top spot in the list with its neighbor (and rival) high school in Ladue, finished two-tenths of a point behind Ladue High School this year. The rankings, which place a fair amount of weight on the number (not results) of AP tests taken by high school students, also assess schools based on a broad range of data including student performance on state required tests, performance of least-advantaged students, graduation rate and college-readiness performance.

Family Center Celebrates Earth Day



The Orange Room students of the Family Center got the opportunity to learn about the environment in a unique way on Earth Day. They planted a River Birch tree in Shaw Park with the help of The City of Clayton's Parks Department.

"We regularly go on field trips as a part of our curriculum and go on nature walks at Shaw Park," said Susan Goldwasser, an early childhood educator

at The Family Center. The students would regularly learn about the different plants and trees in Shaw Park on their nature walks. One of the books they read, "The Boy Who Grew

a Forest: The True Story of Jadav Payeng," inspired them to take action. They decided to do something a little different and came up with the idea to plant a tree.

"Our kids have been learning all year long how to be agents of change...", said Emily Andes, another early childhood educator at The Family Center. "In developing and understanding how to be an agent of change it is important to take action."

Honoring Dr. Sean Doherty's Contributions to the School District of Clayton



Since becoming superintendent in 2015, Dr. Sean Doherty worked tirelessly as our community's "lead learner." The Clayton Education Foundation has launched a campaign to honor and commemorate his contributions to the District.

Because he began his career as an elementary teacher and served as

principal at Captain Elementary School, this campaign will fund a book collection for each of the District's three elementary school libraries. Books for the Dr. Sean Doherty Collection will be selected by each school's librarian and identified by a custom bookplate picturing Dr. Doherty and his rescue dog, Gryff.

The Equity Corner

I've been reading a book by an educator that I have the utmost respect for, Dr. Howard Fields. The title of his book is "How to Achieve Educational Equity." I recommend this book to all educational institutions pursuing a culture change inspired by equity.

On page 36, he poses a simple, but complex, question that all members of the school community - staff, teachers, administrators, parents, Board of Education - must ask themselves: How am I being complicit in educational inequities? Most educators don't have an answer to this question right off the bat. It takes a lot of self-reflection, objectiveness, and awareness to be able to answer that question. We are asking ourselves that question before building the skills of being able to self-reflect on our practices. So how do we create avenues to self-reflect? On page 41, Dr. Fields says, "If you are benefitting from the system or have not had any major issues, you may not be able to identify inequities."
