Superintendent Update - Nov. 20, 2020

Dear Clayton Community,

We have had all of our in-person learning students back in our buildings for two weeks. While it hasn't been without challenges, it's been so good to see our schools alive with students who are engaged in learning. The students in our buildings who I have talked with appreciate the opportunity to learn with their peers (even though everyone is wearing a face covering and six feet apart).

We continue to look very closely at the positive cases and impacts of quarantines within our schools. Our contact tracing of students or staff who test positive for COVID-19 has not shown any evidence of in-school transmission of the virus. This data indicates that our risk mitigation efforts and quarantine procedures are having their intended effect. However, it's still going to take all of us to be vigilant to keep in-person learning in place at our schools.

One of the most important things we can do as a learning community is to stay home when we are sick or experiencing any COVID-19 symptoms. Making the responsible choice can have a tremendous impact on everyone around you. Choosing to come to school or work with COVID-19 symptoms can lead to those around you being placed in quarantine when it could have otherwise been avoided. The number of students and staff who were quarantined this week could have been significantly reduced if individuals recognized symptoms and chose to stay home. This video from some of our seniors at CHS reinforces that message.

As many of our families get ready to celebrate Thanksgiving, I ask all of us to be mindful of the choices we will make next week. There are countless recommendations about how to celebrate the upcoming holidays safely and things to consider before traveling. We have also included <u>some information</u> on our website and in this week's edition of eNews. This pandemic has and will cause us all to make some difficult personal choices. Please be mindful how your choices can impact you and others.

All my best to you and your families for a safe, restful and peaceful Thanksgiving.

As we get ready for Thanksgiving Break, please consider how your holiday plans can be modified to reduce the spread of COVID-19 to keep your family and friends safe and minimize the spread of illness once classes resume after the break.


The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) offers a <u>number of considerations for</u> <u>how your holiday plans can be modified</u> to reduce the spread of COVID-19 to keep your friends, families and communities healthy and safe.

The most recent guidelines recommend limiting holiday gatherings to those within your household and avoiding travel. Precautions and safety measures do make a difference and will give us the best chance of continuing to offer in-person learning. To keep our schools open, it will require all of us working together and taking the necessary precautions. Please continue to be diligent about following safety protocols, including mask-wearing, physical distancing and staying home when sick.

Current CDC <u>Guidelines for Travel During the COVID-19 Pandemic</u> state that travel increases your chance of getting and spreading COVID-19. If you do make the decision to travel, take these actions to protect others from getting sick after you return:

- When around others, <u>stay at least 6 feet</u> (about 2 arms' length) from other people who are not from your household. It is important to do this everywhere, both indoors and outdoors.
- Wear a <u>mask</u> to keep your nose and mouth covered when you are outside of your home.
- <u>Wash your hands</u> often or use hand sanitizer (with at least 60% alcohol).
- Monitor your health and look for <u>symptoms of COVID-19</u>. Take your temperature if you feel sick.

Board of Education Election Notice



Filing for the Board of Education Election will begin on **Tuesday, Dec. 15, 2020, at 8 a.m.** and continue through **Tuesday, Jan. 19, 2021, at 5 p.m.** All filings will take place at the Clayton Administrative Center located at #2 Mark Twain Circle.

Except for the first and last day of filing, all filings will be taken by appointment

due to COVID-19. For an appointment, call 314-854-6017 or email Sandy Menchella.

Ballot order for all candidates who file by 5 p.m. on Dec. 15 will be determined by random drawing. Candidates filing after Dec. 15 will be placed on the ballot in the order of filing. Appointments for filing will not occur or be accepted on days the District office is closed due to inclement weather, the COVID-19 pandemic or on the following dates: Dec. 23, 2020 through Jan. 4, 2021 and Jan. 18, 2021

Candidates must wear a face covering and observe the District's mitigation measures at the time of filing.

The terms of Vice President Amy Rubin and Treasurer Jason Wilson expire in April 2021. Two directors will be elected on April 6, 2021.

The CARES Act Makes More Donations Deductible

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act includes up to a \$300 charitable donation deduction per taxpayer, whether they itemize or not. Only money given to tax-exempt, nonprofit organizations, like the <u>Clayton Education Foundation</u>, counts toward the \$300 limit.

Donated stock, furniture, clothes or other goods and services are not eligible nor are donations to donor-advised funds.

In addition, individuals may elect to deduct donations up to 100 percent of 2020 adjusted gross income. Corporations may deduct up to 25 percent of taxable income.


SSD Staff and Community Award Nominations

Nutritional Notes

Trying to think of a simple, inexpensive, healthy ingredient to your meals this fall? Think about beans. They boast a number of health benefits and as the weather cools off they are a great addition to many recipes, making meals a bit heartier.

Beans are packed with protein and fiber, while low in fat. The recommended daily

intake of fiber is 25 to 38 grams per day and beans typically have anywhere from 8 to 15 grams per serving. Fiber is found to help keep us regular, protect against high cholesterol, high blood pressure and other digestive illnesses.

Beans can be added to soups, pureed to add thickness, added to increase texture and even roasted to add a crispiness to your recipes. Some other beans to try that you may not typically think of are chickpeas and lentils.
